

January

Alzheimer's Awareness Month (Canada)

Tamil Heritage Month (Canada)

15 - 18 Pongal

A harvest celebration known as Pongal is observed by the Tamil population. It is a time to give thanks to the Sun, Mother Nature, and all the farm animals who helped produce a bumper crop. (Hinduism)

1 New Year's Day

The first day of the year of the modern Gregorian calendar. (International)

4 World Braille Day

observed in order to increase understanding of the value of braille as a tool for communication in the full realisation of the rights of those who are blind or partially sighted. celebrates the birthdate of Louis Braille, who created braille. (International)

6 Epiphany

A Christian celebration that principally honours the Magi's visit to the baby Jesus Christ. Several Orthodox churches observe Christmas on January 7, but others observe it on January 19. (Christianity) 7 Christmas / Feast of the Nativity (Orthodox / Eastern)

The Julian calendar date that corresponds to December 25. On or around this date, a large number of Orthodox Christians observe Christmas day. The Orthodox Church

13 Lohri

A well-known wintertime Punjabi folk event that is mostly observed by Sikhs and Hindus in the Punjab area of India. Hinduism and Sikhism

16 Martin Luther King Jr Day

Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday is observed as a federal holiday in the United States. The third Monday in January, which is close to King's real birthday on January 15th, marks the occasion. (The United States)

17 Raoul Wallenberg Day

Wallenberg, Raoul Day celebrates the life of Raoul Wallenberg, the first honorary citizen of Canada, who is credited with saving the lives of tens of thousands of Hungarian Jews. (Canada)

21 Lincoln Alexander Day

An annual celebration honouring The Hon. Lincoln Alexander, who was the first black member of the House of Commons, the first black federal minister, and the first black chair of the Ontario Worker's Compensation Board. Alexander was a trailblazer in the fight for racial fairness in Canada. (Canada) 22 Lunar New Year / Spring Festival

The start of a lunar calendar year is known as the Lunar New Year. The Lunar New Year, often known as Chinese New Year, is observed in several Asian nations, including Mongolia, Korea, and Vietnam. In China, the Spring Festival is a fifteen-day festival that starts on the lunar calendar's New Year's Eve and concludes with the Lantern Festival. (International)

24 International Day of Education

UN-designated day to advance SDG 4, which calls for inclusive and equitable quality education and the promotion of opportunities for lifelong learning for all. (International)

24 World Day for African and Afrodescendant Culture

World Day for African and Afrodescendant Culture, established by UNESCO, celebrates the numerous rich cultures of the African continent and the African Diasporas around the world and promotes them as a powerful tool for sustainable development, communication, and peace. (International)

26 Vasant Panchami

A Hindu festival honouring the goddess Saraswati, the embodiment of knowledge, wisdom, learning, and the arts, which celebrates the arrival of spring. (Hinduism) 29 National Day of Remembrance of the Quebec City Mosque Attack and Action Against

Islamophobia

A day set aside to remember the Islamophobic attack in Quebec City's Grand Mosque, which claimed six lives and left 19 others critically injured. The Canadian government created this remembrance day in 2021 to pay tribute to the deaths and provide support for the survivors of this catastrophe. (Canada)

February

Black History Month (Canada) African Heritage Month (Nova Scotia) 1 - 7 White Cane Week

To raise public awareness of the reality of life for Canadians who are blind or visually impaired, the Canadian Council of the Blind launched White Cane Week, which takes place the first full week of February. (Canada) 1 - 7 World Interfaith Harmony Week

The General Assembly established World Interfaith Harmony Week in 2010, and it now occurs annually during the first week of February. In order to foster harmony among all people, regardless of their religious affiliation, the General Assembly established World Interfaith Harmony Week and stressed that interreligious dialogue and mutual understanding are essential elements of a culture of peace.

22- April 8 Lent (Western)

A forty-day fasting regimen before Easter (excluding Sundays). Giving up particular foods, drinks, and activities, increased prayer, making personal improvements, and contributing to charity are observed throughout this period (almsgiving). (Christianity) 1 World Hijab Day

Nazma Khan created World Hijab Day to honour the millions of Muslim women who choose to wear the hijab as well as to encourage religious tolerance and understanding by allowing women (both Muslims and non-Muslims who are not hijabis) to experience the hijab for a single day. (International)

2 Groundhog Day

Pennsylvania Dutch superstition gave rise to a well-liked custom in both Canada and the United States. On this day, if a groundhog comes out of its burrow and sees its shadow, winter is predicted to last six more weeks; if it doesn't, spring is predicted to arrive early. (International)

4 World Cancer Day

A day designated by the Union for International Cancer Control to raise cancer awareness and encourage action towards the disease's eradication. (International)

5 Lantern Festival

The Lantern Festival honours departed ancestors and fosters reconciliation, peace, and forgiveness. It is observed in China and other Asian nations by decorating houses and public spaces with vibrant lanterns. The celebration, which commemorates the first full moon of the new lunar year and the conclusion of the Spring Festival, falls on the fifteenth day of the first lunar month. (International)

5 Thaipusam

A Hindu holiday that the Tamil diaspora abroad and the Tamil people in India both observe. The event honours the triumph of right over wrong, light over dark, and knowledge over ignorance. (Hinduism) 6 International Day of Zero Tolerance for Female Genital Mutilation

To encourage the abolition of female genital mutilation, increase attention to human rights, gender equality, sexual education, and the needs of women and girls who experience its effects. (International) 11 International Day of Women and Girls in Science

A day set aside to combat gender stereotypes, specifically to eliminate structural and institutional bias against women in science. (International)

13 World Radio Day

An international holiday honouring radio's continuing influence in fostering the diversity, pluralism, and representation necessary to create a world that is more tolerant and inclusive. (International) 14 Valentine's Day

A day of romance when people honour their romantic relationships. This event has a fifth-century history and is named for the Christian martyr St. Valentine. (International)

15 National Flag of Canada Day

A day set aside to honour the unveiling of the Canadian flag in 1965. Observances of the day include flying the flag, sporadic public rituals, and instructional initiatives in schools. (Canada) 15 Parinirvana / Nirvana Day

An annual festival celebrated by Mahayana Buddhists that honours the passing of the Buddha and his entry into Nirvana, which is thought to be a release from the cycle of birth and death. (Buddhism) 18 Maha Shivaratri

Maha Shivaratri, which translates to "Big Night of Shiva" in Sanskrit, is an annual Hindu festival honouring the deity Shiva. One of the most important spiritual festivals in Hinduism, the festival is commemorated with fasting, jagran (an all-night vigil), and worship. (Hinduism)

18 Lailat al Miraj

a Muslim festival that honours the Prophet Muhammad's overnight trip from Mecca to Jerusalem, during which he attained heaven, underwent purification, and received the command to offer Salat (ritual prayer) five times daily. Also known as Al Isra'wal Miraj, Laylat al Miraj, and Isra and Mi'raj. starts before dusk. (Islam)

20 World Day of Social Justice

A day honouring the "Declaration on Social Justice for a Fair Globalization" of the International Labor Organization. It is predicated on the idea that achieving and maintaining peace and security both inside and between nations require social development and social justice. This is accomplished by advocating for issues such as gender equality, the rights of migrants and indigenous peoples, or by joining forces to break down obstacles that people encounter due to their gender, age, race, ethnicity, religion, culture, or

20 Family Day

Civic holiday in Alberta, British Columbia, Ontario, Saskatchewan, and New Brunswick, which celebrates the importance of family. (Canada)

20 Islander Day

A civic holiday observed in Prince Edward Island in celebration of family and community. (Canada)

20 Louis Riel Day

Civic holiday in Manitoba which commemorates the life of Louis Riel, Métis leader of the Red River Resistance of 1869-70 and the driving force behind Manitoba becoming Canada's fifth province. (Canada)

20 Nova Scotia Heritage Day

Civic holiday in Nova Scotia to remember the province's storied past and honour the remarkable people, places and events that have contributed to the province's unique heritage. (Canada)

21 International Mother Language Day

A worldwide annual observance to promote awareness of linguistic and cultural diversity and to promote multilingualism. (International)

21 Losar (Tibetan New Year)

a festival marking the start of the new year that takes place on the first day of the lunisolar Tibetan calendar, which falls in either February or March by the Gregorian calendar. It is one of the most joyous times of the year, marked by numerous religious and cultural celebrations. (Tibet)

22 Pink Shirt Day

An international awareness day to promote anti-bullying. (International)

22 Ash Wednesday

Marks the first day of Lent. The name is derived from the symbolic use of ashes to signify penitence. (Christianity)

2 - 20 Nineteen Day Fast

A period when adult Bahá'ís fast from sunrise to sunset each day, coinciding with the 19-day Bahá'í month of Alá (loftiness) and immediately preceding the Bahá'í new year. This period of fasting is a time of prayer, meditation, and spiritual rejuvenation. Begins at previous sundown. (Bahá'í)

8 - 10 Hola Mohalla

This annual festival was started by the tenth Sikh Guru, Guru Gobind Singh, as a gathering of Sikhs for military exercises and mock battles on the day following the festival of Holi (sometimes coinciding with Holi). The festival exists to remind people of valor and defense preparedness. (Sikhism)

22 - April 20 Ramadan

In Islam, Ramadan is the holy month whereby Muslims fast during daylight hours. It is a period that aims to cleanse one's body and soul from impurities and re-focus oneself to the worship of God. (Islam)

1 Zero Discrimination Day

Zero Discrimination Day celebrates the right of everyone to live a full and productive life—and live it with dignity. It highlights how people can become informed about and promote inclusion, compassion, peace, and a movement for change in order to end all forms of discrimination. (International)

1 Self-harm Awareness Day

Self-harm Awareness Day (also known as Self-injury Awareness Day) is dedicated to ending the stigma around self-harm and raising awareness about available supports and alternative coping methods. (International)

3 Employee Appreciation Day

Employee Appreciation Day falls on the first Friday of March and acts as a reminder of the importance of showing appreciation to employees and building a culture of appreciation. (International)

6 Magha Puja

An important Buddhist festival, celebrated on the full moon day of the third lunar month in Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, Sri Lanka and on the full moon day of Tabaung in Myanmar. It celebrates a gathering between the Buddha and 1,250 of his first disciples. (Buddhism)

7 Chötrul Düchen

Chötrul Düchen, the "Festival of Miracles", takes place on the 15th day of the first Tibetan lunar month during the full moon. It is one of the four Buddhist festivals commemorating four events in the life of the Buddha and celebrates the first fifteen days of the year when Buddha displayed a different miracle on each day. (Buddhism)

7 Purim

The festival of Purim commemorates the heroism of Esther, and the salvation of the Jewish people from Haman in the Achaemenid Empire (Persian Era). Begins at previous sundown. (Judaism)

8 International Women's Day

A global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating women's equality. (International)

8 Holi

A Hindu spring festival celebrated predominantly in India by both Hindu and non-Hindu people, also known as the "festival of colours" or the "festival of love". Holi represents the arrival of spring and the triumph of good over evil, and on this one day, the usual rankings of caste, gender, status, and age are ignored in favour of celebrating together by throwing colored water and powders on one another. (Hinduism)

17 Saint Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day is a global celebration of Irish culture on March 17, the anniversary of the death of St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, in the fifth century. The Irish have observed this day as a religious holiday for over 1,000 years. (International) 20 International Francophonie Day

A day to celebrate the French language, culture, and values. (International)

20 Spring Equinox

In the Northern Hemisphere, the Spring Equinox (also known as the vernal equinox or March Equinox) occurs when the sun crosses the equator line, heading north. This event marks the start of the spring season in the northern half of the globe. (International) 20 International Day of Happiness Since 2013, the United Nations has celebrated the International Day of Happiness as a way to recognise the importance of happiness in the lives of people around the world. (International) 21 Nowruz / Norouz (Bahá'í / Zoroastrian / Iranian / Persian New Year)

The word "Nowruz" (spelling varies by region: Now Ruz, Naw-Ruz, Now Roz, Novruz, Navruz, Nooruz, Nevruz, or Nauryz) translates to "new day". It marks the first day of spring and is celebrated as the beginning of the new year by more than 300 million people all around the world. Nowruz has been celebrated for over 3,000 years in the Balkans, the Black Sea Basin, the Caucasus, Central Asia, the Middle East and other regions. Originally celebrated by the Zoroastrians, it is also a holy day in the Bahá'í, Sufi, and Ismaili faiths. (International)

21 International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination

Declared by the UN, this day remembers the damaging effects of racial discrimination and is a reminder to continue building a world with justice and equality. (International)

21 World Down Syndrome

Day A day to raise public awareness of Down syndrome and the effective and meaningful inclusion and participation of all people with Down Syndrome in spaces where decisions are being made about matters relating to or affecting their lives. (International)

22 Ugadi / Yugadi Ugadi

Yugadi is derived from two Sanskrit words, "yuga" (age) and "ādi" (beginning), to mean "the beginning of a new age". It is celebrated as the first day of the year as it is believed that it was on this day that Lord Brahma created the universe. (Hinduism)

22 World Water Day

World Water Day celebrates water and raises awareness of the 2.2 billion people living without access to safe water. It is about taking action to tackle the global water crisis. A core focus of World Water Day is to support the achievement of Sustainable Development Goal 6: water and sanitation for all by 2030. (International)

25 International Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade

This is a United Nations international observation that offers the opportunity to honour and remember those who suffered and died at the hands of the brutal slavery system. First observed in 2008, the international day also aims to raise awareness about the dangers of racism and prejudice today. (International)

26 Purple Day

Purple Day is an international grassroots epilepsy awareness initiative created in Nova Scotia by Cassidy Megan. People are encouraged to wear purple on March 26 to promote epilepsy awareness worldwide. (International) 30 Ram Navami

Ram Navami is a Hindu celebration of commemorating the birth of Lord Rama, an incarnation of Lord Vishnu and son of King Dasharatha of Ayodhya. (Hinduism)

31 International Transgender Day of Visibility

The International Transgender Day of Visibility recognizes the struggles, sacrifices and achievements of those who fought, and continue to fight, for gender equity. This day highlights our friends, family, colleagues and neighbours who contribute to the diversity in Canada, and it encourages us to recognize that transgender and non-binary individuals continue to resist oppression by simply being exactly who they are. (International)

2 - 8 Holy Week (Orthodox / Eastern)

A period of continued fasting and religious observance following the Great Fast (Great Lent), beginning on Palm Sunday and ending with the feast of Pascha. (Christianity)

6 - 13 Passover / Pesach

Passover celebrates the deliverance of the Jewish people from slavery in Egypt. The first two nights are commemorated with telling the story of the exodus from Egypt over a special meal called a Seder. Begins at previous sundown. (Judaism)

6 - 8 Theravada

New Year Celebrated for three days following the first full moon in April, Theravadan Buddhists celebrate the new year by going to the temple, offering prayers, wearing new clothes, cleaning their homes, and hosting feasts. The date and length vary among different countries and the diaspora. (Buddhism)

2 World Autism Awareness Day

The United Nations General Assembly unanimously declared April 2 as World Autism Awareness Day to highlight the need to help improve the quality of life of those with autism so they can lead full and meaningful lives as an integral part of society. (International)

2 Palm Sunday

A Christian celebration of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem the week prior to his death and resurrection, which marks the start of Holy Week. (Christianity)

4 National Caregiver Day

Unanimously adopted by the Members of Parliament of Canada to recognize the importance of the "invisible" unpaid work, this day provides an opportunity for formal recognition of caregivers and their contributions.

(Canada)

6 Holy Thursday / Maundy Thursday (Western)

Falling on the Thursday before Easter, Holy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus Christ. (Christianity)

7 World Health Day

A global observance day where each year draws attention to a specific health topic of concern to people all over the world. (International)

8 Vesak (Buddha Day)

"Vesak", the Day of the Full Moon in the month of May, is the most sacred day to millions of Buddhists around the world. It was on the Day of Vesak two and a half millennia ago, in the year 623 B.C., that the Buddha was born. It was also on the Day of Vesak that the Buddha attained enlightenment, and it was on the Day of Vesak that the Buddha in his eightieth year passed away. (Buddhism)

9 Easter (Western)

Also called 'Pascha', this is one of the holiest days in the Christian (Western) calendar. Easter commemorates the resurrection of Jesus from death, three days after his crucifixion. (Christianity)

12 International Day of Pink

Celebrated on the second Wednesday of April, this is a day when people around the world are encouraged to put on a pink shirt and stand in solidarity with the LGBTQ2S+ community to continue fighting for equality and acceptance. 14 Vaisakhi / Baisakhi

The first day of the solar year, this is an agricultural festival celebrating the harvest, especially in North India. Tamils and Sri Lankans celebrate their New Year on this day. In Kerala, South India this day is called Vishu. Especially important to the Sikhs, it marks this day in 1699, when the tenth Guru, Guru Gobind Singh, established the order of 'Khalsa'. The festival is a mixture of feasting, dancing, and worship. (Sikhism)

15 Vishu

Vishu is a spring festival observed by Malayali Hindus in Kerala and in adjacent areas of Tamil Nadu, India. Vishu (Sanskrit: "equal") celebrates the vernal equinox when day and night are roughly equal length. (Hinduism)

18 Laylat al-Qadr (Shi'ah)

It is most commonly observed on the 23rd night of Ramadan for Shi'ah Muslims and on the 27th for Sunni Muslims. It begins the previous evening. (Shi'ah Islam) 18 Yom HaShoah

Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) is an international day of commemoration, started in Israel, on which the six million Jews murdered in the Holocaust are memorialized. Begins at previous sundown. (Judaism / international) 21 Eid Al-Fitr

A Muslim celebration to mark the end of Ramadan, the holy month of dawn to sunset fasting. This day is celebrated with feasts, gifts, and prayers in honour of God. Begins at previous sundown. (Islam)

22 Earth Day

Earth Day aims to raise awareness and demonstrate support of environmental protection, with many events held around the world. (International)

Although these groups share many similarities, they each have their own distinct heritage, language, cultural practices, and spiritual beliefs. (Canada)

21 Summer Solstice

In the Northern Hemisphere, the Summer Solstice (also known as the June Solstice) occurs when the sun travels along its northernmost path in the sky. The Summer Solstice is the day with the most hours of sunlight in the whole year, making it the "longest day" of the year. 19 World Humanitarian Day

This day is dedicated to humanitarians worldwide, as well as to increase public understanding of humanitarian assistance activities. (International)

26 Women's Equality Day:

This day marks the anniversary of women gaining the right to vote in the year 1920

This is a UN designated day which promotes charitable efforts made to alleviate poverty worldwide. (International) 7 Ukrainian Heritage Day

Ukrainian Heritage Day was created in March 2011, when the Ontario Legislature unanimously passed Bill155 - the Ukrainian Heritage Day Act, which proclaimed September 7 of each year Ukrainian Heritage Day. September 7, 1891 is the date on which the first Ukrainian immigrants, Vasyl Eleniak and Ivan Pylypiw, arrived in Canada. (Ontario) **15 International Day of Democracy** 17 Rosh HaShanah

Rosh HaShanah celebrates the creation of the universe. Begins at previous sundown. (Judaism) **19 Ganesh Chaturthi**

This Hindu festival honours of one of Hinduism's major deities , Ganesh, the elephant-headed god. He is known as the 'remover of all obstacles' and is invoked at the beginning of all new undertakings. (Hinduism)

21 International Day of Peace

This is a day to recognize the efforts of those who have worked hard to end conflict and promote peace. It is also considered to be a day of ceasefire – personal or political. (International)

23 Fall Equinox



Public commemoration of the tragic and painful history and ongoing impacts of residential schools is a vital component of the reconciliation process. The creation of this federal statutory holiday was through legislative amendments made by Parliament. September 30 is also Orange Shirt Day, a day to wear an orange shirt as a way to remember the story of Phyllis (Jack) Webstad, whose orange shirt was taken away from her when she was sent to a residential school at age six. The date was chosen because this was the time of year children were taken from their homes and placed in residential schools. (Canada)

For some LGBTQ2S+ folks this day is an opportunity to celebrate their identities publicly. (International)

16 Birth of the Báb

Celebrates the birth of the Báb, the prophet-herald of the Bahá'í community. In the Bahá'í calendar, the Birth of the Báb and the Birth of Bahá'u'lláh are celebrated one after the other in one festival referred to as the "Twin Holy Days". (Bahá'í)

18 International Pronouns Day

International Pronouns Day is about respect, sharing, education and normalizing personal pronouns. (International) 22 International Stuttering Awareness Day

International Stuttering Awareness Day is intended to raise public awareness of stuttering, which affects one percent of the world's population. (International)

24 Dussehra

A Hindu celebration on the last day of Navaratri, celebrating the victory of good over evil. (Hinduism) 26 Intersex Awareness Day A day to encourage dialogue and raise awareness on the human rights violations faced by intersex people. (International)

31 Halloween

Halloween, which takes place on October 31, is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, though it shares important ties with various other celebrations from several faiths and cultures, including Día de los Muertos (or the Day of the Dead), All Saints Day, and All Souls Day. Halloween made its way over to the United States with British and Irish colonists, eventually becoming the holiday we know today, with traditions of door-to-door trick-or-treating and decorations. (International)

In Mexico and, to a lesser degree, elsewhere in Latin America, the Day of the Dead (or Día de los Muertos) is an opportunity for family and friends to honor and remember deceased loved ones. The observation of the day likely has roots in the rituals of the pre-Hispanic people of Mexico. After Spanish colonization and the arrival of Catholicism, the holiday became intertwined with All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day and is celebrated on All Saints' Day, November 1. (International)

9 Diwali (Hindu)

Diwali, also known as the Festival of Lights, is one of the most important festivals in Indian religions. It symbolises the spiritual "victory of light over darkness, good over evil, and knowledge over ignorance". The festival is widely associated with conflagrations between good and evil entities.

11 Remembrance

Day Commemorates the members of the armed forces who have sacrificed their lives during the World Wars and other military efforts in history and currently. (Canada)

19 International Men's Day

International Men's Day celebrates the positive value men bring to the world, their families, and communities, highlights positive role models, and raises awareness of men's well-being and mental health. One of the six pillars of International Men's Day is to improve gender relations and promote gender equality for men and women. 20 Transgender Day of Remembrance

A day to memorialize those who have been murdered as a result of transphobia and to bring attention to the continued violence endured by the transgender community. (International)

20 National Child Day

Canada has declared November 20th as National Child Day to celebrate the rights of children. November 20th was chosen as the day to celebrate National Child Day because the United Nations adopted the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) on November 20, 1989. (Canada)

27 Guru Nanak Gurpurab

One of the most sacred festivals in Sikhism, Gurpurab celebrates the birth of the first Sikh gurus Guru Nanak Dev Ji, the founder of Sikhism. Guru Nanak is highly revered by the Sikh community and was one of the most celebrated Sikh gurus. (Sikhism)

1 World AIDS Day

Designated on December 1 every year since 1988, is an international day dedicated to raising awareness of the AIDS pandemic caused by the spread of HIV infection and mourning those who have died of the disease. (International) **3 International Day of Persons with Disabilities**

Promoted by the UN, this day is to promote an understanding of disability issues and mobilize support for the dignity, rights, and well-being of persons with disabilities. (International)

4 International Volunteer Day

The United Nations Volunteers Programme coordinates International Volunteer Day on December 5 every year to recognize and promote the tireless work, not just of UN Volunteers, but of volunteers across the globe. (International)

8 Bodhi Day

Bodhi Day celebrates the day Siddhartha Gautama, Sakyamuni Buddha, achieved enlightenment. Known as Rohatsu or Jodo-e in Japan and elsewhere by other names, this holiday is widely observed in the Mahayana traditions of East Asia and across the globe. (Buddhism)

10 Human Rights Day

A day to honour the UN General Assembly's adoption and proclamation, on December 10, 1948, of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), the first global enunciation of human rights. (Internationale) **21 Winter Solstice**

In the Northern Hemisphere, the Winter Solstice occurs when the sun travels along its southernmost path in the sky. The Winter Solstice is the day with the fewest hours of sunlight in the whole year, making it the "shortest day" of the year. This marks the astronomical start of

25 Christmas Day

A holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. It is recognized as a public holiday in many nations around the world and is also celebrated secularly by many non-Christians. (Christianity)

26 Boxing Day

The day after Christmas Day was traditionally celebrated as the day tradesmen and servants would receive gifts from their employers. (International)

26 Zartosht No-Diso / Death of Prophet Zarathustra

This day marks the death of the founder of the Zoroastrian faith. (Zoroastrianism)
